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A Pioneer in the Community: Dorothy Richardson



"I believe people get their roots down when they own their houses... take pride in them. That, in turn, is good for a whole city. Why should a neighborhood be a slum when it can be a place of good, livable homes?"

As NHS of Bedford-Stuyvesant celebrates 20 years of excellence in the community, we are proud to be a part of the 45-year legacy of service to the community, working hard to empower residents in the housing sector. This legacy reaches back to 1967, when Dorothy Richardson of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania began a campaign to defend at-risk members of her community from predatory business and political practices and to improve their quality of life. Richardson and a small group of her neighbors established a block club in a fight to save their dying neighborhood in Pittsburgh's Central North Side. They recruited partners in local government and the business community. This group blossomed into 'Citizens Against Slum Housing' (CASH), which took City Hall and property owners to task for the deplorable living conditions in minority-dominated areas of Pittsburgh. Through high-profile community organizing and targeted pressure on the power structure, they won their battle. In doing so, Richardson (who eventually attained a seat in the Pittsburgh Housing Authority) and her allies, set a precedent that changed the nation's approach to urban redevelopment and spawned the new field of community-based development.

CASH spawned an organization called Neighborhood Housing Services (NHS), which is now a publically-funded association of service providers working under the umbrella of NeighborWorks® America. Today, more than 237 community-based organizations across the country provide homebuyer education, homeownership preservation, community leadership and financial empowerment to residents. Each year, NeighborWorks® America recognizes and awards a select group of outstanding community leaders who have demonstrated loyalty, commitment and have made tremendous strides in their community with the Dorothy Richardson Award for Resident Leadership. In 2008, Mr. Reginald D. Shell, Treasurer of the board of directors of NHS of Bedford-Stuyvesant was the recipient of this award.

Giving Back to the Community: Former NHSBS Customer Gives Back

Ms. Brena Bracy-Seals is a retired military service member who was referred to NHS of Bedford-Stuyvesant (NHSBS) through Habitat for Humanity's Sweat Equity Homeownership Program. Ms. Bracy-Seals came to NHSBS for first-time homeownership counseling education as well as to qualify for Down Payment and Closing Cost Assistance. A single person hoping to buy a condominium unit, she submitted financial documentation for a mortgage analysis and to determine if she was eligible for financial assistance. Ms. Bracy-Seals attended and completed the Homebuyer Education Workshop. While in the Homebuyer Education Workshop, she learned the importance of maintaining a home and further took advantage of NHSBS' Home Maintenance Training Workshop: there she learned how to do basic household repairs like understanding basic carpentry techniques, framing for windows and doors and installing switches and outlets.

After graduating from the Homebuyer Education Workshop, Brena secured a mortgage loan with a 2% interest rate and was awarded financial assistance in the amount of \$7125, which was used to help cover out-of-pocket costs. She closed on her condo unit in February, 2010. Brena has been very active in her local and surrounding communities and serves on her building's Board of Directors. She shares a great deal of information with her neighbors and associates about the importance of good financial behavior, and of working closely with a reputable non-profit like NHSBS. Happily and securely in her home, she believes that anyone looking to purchase a home should utilize their local non-profits to educate themselves on the process.



Brena has since joined the board of directors of NHSBS: she was so pleased with her personal situation that she wanted to make sure that other residents in the community had the opportunity to benefit from the host of products and services available at NHSBS. She advocates for NHSBS in her daily life and never hesitates to recommend a potential client and/or community partner. 'NHSBS has provided me with opportunities to participate in educating the community in a variety of ways: for instance, home maintenance training, budgeting, foreclosure prevention strategies and awareness of the dangers of LEAD poison in our homes'.

In 2001, she was transferred to the Bedford-Stuyvesant office where the Director at the time, Mr. Orville Braithwaite, submitted a grant proposal to hire her as a part-time Program Assistant. Short after, the position transitioned into the now Administrative Assistant position.



Program Manager and Homeownership Counselor Kevin Washington is feting his 11th year with NHS. In 2001, under the umbrella of the National Insurance Task Force, via NHS of Staten Island (NHSSI), Kevin served as a consultant informing homeowners and renters of the importance of having insurance and maintaining it. After three years with NHS of Staten Island, Kevin joined the NHS Bedford-Stuyvesant staff as the Marketing Coordinator: shortly after, he became the Homeownership Counselor and has served in the dual role as Program Manager since 2005.

NHS of Bedford-Stuyvesant Says Farewell to Two Board Members



Ann Kearney was born on August 5, 1946 in Ft. Lauderdale, Florida. As a small child, she moved with her family to Atmore, Alabama where she attended Escambia County Elementary School. When she was in 7th grade, her parents made the decision to send her to live with her older sister in Long Island, New York. Anne attended Westbury Junior High School and Westbury High School, going on to earn a degree in Accounting from Baruch College. She met Franklin Kearney and fell in love, marrying him on November 17, 1972. During her vibrant life and illustrious career, Anne worked with several companies (including New York Telephone, Home Box Office, and the New York Department of Education). She also worked for the New York City Housing Authority for twenty years and recently retired as Manager of Stuyvesant Gardens Houses.

Very involved in her community, Anne held several positions in her block association, including Vice President. She became a liaison between the New York City Police Department and the community, earning a certificate from the NYPD's Citizens Police Academy. Anne joined the board of directors of NHS of Bedford-Stuyvesant in 2005, and in 2006 she was appointed to the position of Secretary. All who knew her respected her brainpower and her ability to tell a great story. She was devoted "Aunt Koochi"- smart, funny, and pretty; she had it all! Anne loved flowers, children, and animals. Most of all, she loved life. The sun set on Anne Thursday, July 26th, 2012. A force to be reckoned with, we mourn her death as we celebrate her life.



Eva Phillips was born on September 11, 1927 and raised in Harlem. Ms. Phillips studied design and dressmaking as a young girl. Her passion was to always own her own business and design her own style of fashion. Eva followed her dream and established her own dress shop which thrived for over 35 years. Her mother, a single parent, raised six children and she was the baby of the bunch. Eva married her childhood sweetheart at age 19: they shared 33 wonderful years together before he passed away. Eva was the first Treasurer of NHS Bedford-Stuyvesant when it was established at Bridge Street Church, twenty years ago. She was extremely active in the community and had a passion for youth development. She devoted most of her free time to providing activities for young people in the community.

She believed that young people needed constructive things to do in order to keep their minds occupied and away from bad temptation. She was president of Good Neighbors of Madison Street Block Association in 1984 where she served as President for 26 years and then Vice President until her passing on September 4th 2012. Eva always planned to write a book about her life. She cherished every moment of it and always wanted to share her experiences with the world. Eva served as the Assistant Treasurer for the board of directors of NHS of Bedford-Stuyvesant from 2005 through 2009: in 2010 she stepped down from the board of directors and became an Advisory Board member. In 2011, Eva shared the spotlight with three other founding board members of NHSBS and was honored at a lavish reception held at the Victorian Mansion in Bedford-Stuyvesant. Eva was a pillar in the community and she will truly be missed.
